FROM THE PREACHERS DESK <u>A Different Kind of Faith</u>

Faith comes in a variety of sizes. We don't have a way to measure the size of faith, but there are things that we can do to test our faith, not only in God, but in a lot of other things as well.

For instance, in the past when I heard a person going on and on about how their favorite team was going to win the big game, I would, for fun, say to them, "I'll bet you \$100 they lose." I had no intention of making the bet, I just wanted to see their reaction.

Their reaction told me all I wanted to know about what they actually believed. Some would jump at the chance to win an easy \$100. These people were true believers. To them it was not a risk because they were certain of victory. Others would begin to hem and haw and shuffle around. They would start making excuses. They would tell me they don't gamble, to which I would reply, "I thought you were certain. Where is the risk in certainty?" Others would want to lower the wager. They would suggest \$20 instead of \$100, to which I would reply, "Does that mean you are actually twenty percent sure of victory?" Again, I was being facetious.

The principle though, is sound. Our actions enforce what we *actually* believe, which is not always the same as what we *say* we believe.

In Matthew 9:18, we are given an example of a kind of faith that we have not yet seen. A man comes to Jesus who is a part of the religious hierarchy. The New American Standard Bible does him no justice, but simply refers to him as "a synagogue official." The Greek says he is an *archon*, the chief synagogue ruler.

The King James calls him "a certain ruler." The New International, "a synagogue leader." The Easy-to-Read, "a leader of the synagogue."

Why is it important to understand that he is the synagogue leader? It's important because it makes a difference that he is a part of the religious elite. The religious elite don't like Jesus. He is most likely a scribe or a pharisee as was common for synagogue leaders.

Here we have him, and Mark tells us his name is Jairus, coming and bowing down, face to the ground in the pose of worship before Jesus in front of other pharisees and a large crowd of others and he says, Matthew 9:18 -

So far in Matthew's Gospel we have witnessed people being healed of various illnesses but we have not yet encountered a person who believed that Jesus could raise the dead. This is a different kind of faith. A great faith.

It's not just words. He doesn't come under cover of darkness like Nicodemus. He bows down to Jesus in a way that is reserved only for deity. He wouldn't do that, and ruin his religious reputation with the religious elite unless he believed that he was in the presence of the true religious elite one.

How would you describe your faith? Do you use words only? Do you use words coupled with examples of personal actions you've taken?
